#### MCSO COMMEMORATES NATIONAL PREPAREDNESS MONTH


With September being National Preparedness Month, the Monmouth County Sheriff 's Office reinforced the message to prepare, plan, stay informed and get involved. National Preparedness Month, sponsored by the Federal Emergency Management Agency, is an effort to educate the public on how to prepare for emergencies. This year's National Preparedness theme was:

"Disasters Don't Wait. Make Your Plan Today". It focused on different topics each week, which included: Make a Plan, Build a Kit,

Prepare for Disasters, and Teach Youth About Preparedness.

The month is always a great time to reinforce Know Your Zone and learn which evacuation zone you are within by visiting mcsonj.org/ready. The Know Your Zone initiative was implemented by OEM four years ago to educate residents, visitors and businesses about coastal evacuation zones. It allows the Office of Emergency Management to direct any evacuation instructions to those that are at the greatest risk of experiencing storm surge during major coastal storms in protection of lives and property.

- First Aid Kit
- 1 Gallon of water per person, per day for at least 3 days
- Medication
- Special items (diapers, formula glasses)
- Non-perishable food/ Special dietary items
- · Battery operated radio
- · Cell phone chargers
- Emergency cash
- Change of clothes, footwear
- Dust mask
- Face coverings
- Rubber gloves
- Hand sanitizer

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Another way the sheriff's office assists the public in disaster preparedness is to encourage all residents to be equipped with an emergency kit. Emergencies and events can strike fast, so the MCSO urges all to have a kit filled with necessities, should you become displaced and have to evacuate quickly.

To keep up with the most up to date information, it's also important to like or follow the MCSO on social media through Facebook, Monmouth County Sheriff's Office, Twitter, @MonmouthSheriff, and Instagram, monmouthsheriff, all platforms that prove to be extremely useful before, during and after severe weather. In addition, download the agency's application for smartphones. Our app provides instant access to sheriff's office related information, which includes real-time emergency notifications through its integrated push notification system. Users are able to be instantly alerted to weather, or other emergency related situations, from the Monmouth County Sheriff's Office and the agency's OEM.

During the last week of Hurricane Preparedness month we highlighted our extensive Teen CERT program. Teen CERT trains teens to assist when responding to and recovering from emergencies or disasters, and is a great way for youth to become more involved. Through the Teen CERT Program, students from high schools in Monmouth County learn how to prepare themselves, families and communities as they learn about life skills through emergency management preparedness. The goal is to be stronger, safer and better prepared. Training consists of approximately 22 hours and covers basic medical aid, light search and rescue, firefighting, CERT organization, disaster preparedness, disaster psychology and a final exercise scenario.

The MCSO looks forward to having our great Teen CERT members working together with us again in the future.

I'm proud of our exemplary work in preparedness. Throughout the year, we partner with numerous agencies, to prepare for emergencies such as natural disasters, active shooters, mass casualties and chemical threats by conducting drills, training, tabletops exercises and educational programs through OEM. These types of training exercises are critical in ensuring that we can effectively and efficiently respond to crises situations.


Please don't forget that Planning Preparing and Staying Informed are the keys to safety before, during and after a weather related event.



#### EARTHQUAKE SHAKES MONMOUTH COUNTY

Fortunately, the 3.1 magnitude Earthquake felt in Monmouth County and beyond on Sept. 9 did not result in any damage or injuries. However, it once again proved that we must be prepared, since emergencies and events can strike fast.





The earthquake's epicenter was in East Freehold and in very close proximity to our Public Safety Center on Kozloski Rd. The MCSO 911 Communications Center received 125 calls within a half hour period of the earthquake. There was no interruption of service, damage or injuries reported.

# BACK TO SCHOOL SAFFTY TIPS

With the start of a new school year, it's vital to practice back to school safety tips, particularly in these uncertain times. Throughout Sept., Sheriff Golden provided parents and students with helpful safety tips pertaining to COVID-19, bullying and the dangers of strangers. Best of luck to all for a safe and healthy school year.

#### BULLYING

- Talk and listen to your children. Ask questions • about their day and their friends. Make sure your children are comfortable communicating with you.
- Lead by example. Do not speak to people in a mean or abusive way. Do not use a harsh tone. Be polite and let your children know to treat others the way they would like to be treated.
- Make children aware of what not to do through • anti bullying approaches (don't push, tease or be mean to others).
- Teach children to be kind, polite and to take turns.
- Teach children how to react to someone who • is mean to them by getting an adult, telling the person to stop or by ignoring and walking away from that person or situation.
- Be sure children understand what bullying is and that it won't be tolerated for them to bully, be bullied or watch anyone else get bullied.



- Practice healthy and proper hygiene:
  - Wash hands regularly Cough or sneeze into
  - your elbow
  - Don't touch eyes, nose, mouth
  - Don't share cups or food with others

- Stay Healthy.
- If you have a fever or feel sick tell your parents/teachers. Stay home.
- Wear face covering, maintain social distance & follow the teacher's rules.
- No bullying/Don't tease or bully anyone who has been sick.
- Support one another.
- Share information on what you learned about preventing the disease with your family.



#### DANGERS OF STRANGERS

- Never walk alone, always use the buddy system.
- Don't not approach or talk to strangers. If approached by a stranger asking a question ignore them.
- · Do not engage, even if the stranger asks for help or has something you would want to play with such as a puppy or kitten.
- · Never give out personal information about yourself or family.
- If you feel you are in a dangerous situation, yell, run and fight back.
- Do not be afraid of police, they are there to help.
- Know how to dial 9-1-1 and report suspicious activity or behavior.

Special thanks to Monmouth County for providing resources from the Department of Public Works. This collaborative effort helps ensure our communities and roadways stay clean and free from debris and trash.








# **CHILD PASSENGER SAFETY WEEK**
