Mother Nature hit us with a big one on Feb. 1, as Monmouth County was struck with a major snow storm that caused a huge wintery mix. The Monmouth County Sheriff's Office monitored the storm from the Manasquan Inlet, which had mostly rain and wind, to Freehold where heavy snow covered the area. The scene from atop outside the MCSO Public Safety Center's 300ft HD tower in Freehold showed the snow coming down fast and fierce.

The MCSO's K-9 Unit had a dog day afternoon walking the beat and ensuring safety at our train stations. The weather wasn't too ruff on them and nothing stops these K-9s from sniffing out crime.

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
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MCSO WARNS TO STAY OFF THE ICE

MCSO REINFORCES PROJECT MEDICINE DROP TO HELP COMBAT DRUG ABUSE

Sheriff Golden remains a leader in the fight against drug abuse as February marked four years since the Monmouth County Sheriff's Office joined the New Jersey Attorney General's "Project Medicine Drop". The medicine drop box is located at the MCSO along with two mobile drop boxes which are transported to senior centers, in an effort to provide even

greater community outreach to residents. Throughout the years, hundreds of pounds of prescription drugs that





may have ended up in the wrong hands has been collected and disposed. This partnership was another major step in the ongoing fight against heroin and opiate abuse and remains a principal concern and huge commitment of law enforcement.

Project Medicine Drop Box, where you can dispose of unwanted, unused and expired medicine from your homes, is vital. The permanent collection site is located at the front entrance to the Monmouth County Sheriff's Office, at 2500 Kozloski Rd. in Freehold which residents can utilize all year long. Project Medicine Drop is the most beneficial program where the community and law enforcement work together to help combat this epidemic and reduce the amount of prescription drugs that are readily available.

TRIBUTE TO DANIEL MELLACI

It was an emotional tribute to our own Daniel Mellaci, as family, friends and co workers gathered to honor and pay tribute to him in a flag raising ceremony outside Jersey Shore University Medical Center on Feb. 4. The tribute was organized by NJ Sharing Network and JSUMC to recognize organ and tissue donors and their families who make the lifesaving decision to become an organ and tissue donor.



Daniel, a Public Safety Telecommunicator with the MCSO since 2011 and a volunteer firefighter in West Long Branch lost his brave and courageous battle to ALS, but in his last hours gave a lifetime back by donating his organs.

Danny's brave and heroic decision to donate his organs will provide the most precious gift of life to those in need. He will forever remain in our hearts at the Monmouth County Sheriff's Office and our thoughts and prayers are with the Mellaci family during this most difficult time.











GREAT JOB PST

Our Public Safety Telecommunicator in training, Keli Milne who began working in the 9-1-1 Communications Center in December is certainly starting off her career at the MCSO on a positive note.

On Feb. 11, PST Milne answered a 9-1-1 call from a 16 year old male in distress who suffered a severe leg injury while skiing in the woods in Holmdel.

PST Milne spent more than 40 minutes on the phone with the scared individual who was lying in the woods in a steep incline off Holmdel Rd., until he was located by Police and EMS. She calmed the very cold and frightened individual down and found ways to distract him with conversation causing him not to panic.

Sheriff Golden commends PST Milne on this great work. It's calls such as this that makes the job of a Public Safety Telecommunicator rewarding. PSTs are rarely seen and mostly heard but what they say in those few minutes makes a world of difference to those on the other end of the line.

MERT TRAINING

The MCSO's Maritime Emergency Response Team, MERT, recently held training at the Manasquan Reservoir where they practiced with and utilized ropes as a mode of communication between the team and diver. This type of training is extremely important in the event that electronic communications were to fail.


MERT, a shared service, is made up of members from various law enforcement agencies who respond swiftly to critical incidents on our waterways.

WE GOT THIS



How to Report

- 1. Tell a trusted adult
 - a. Your parents/guardians > school
- 2. Report the cyberbullying material to the social media service
- 3. Collect evidence
 - a. Copy URL > screenshots >> recording; via the device its on or another device
- 4. Block the person and discuss your options to prevent future problems
- 5. Contact your local police department (could be your first step if its bad enough to constitute a crime)
