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SHERIFF ASSIGNS OFFICERS TO AUTO THEFT TASK FORCE AS HE CALLS ON STATE OFFICIALS TO ADDRESS THIS MAJOR PROBLEM

As many of you know, the auto theft issue is a major concern of mine and action must be taken as thefts continue to soar at alarming rates due to catch and release and failed bail reform policies. We recently announced, during a Monmouth/Ocean Auto Theft Task Force meeting that the Monmouth County Sheriff's Office assigned six officers to the force. The assigned officers are deployed to certain hot spot areas throughout Monmouth County where they are assisting patrols with local police departments, continuing to investigate the surge in auto theft, which has, and is, increasing at alarming rates, and focusing on the technology aspect with additional license plate readers.

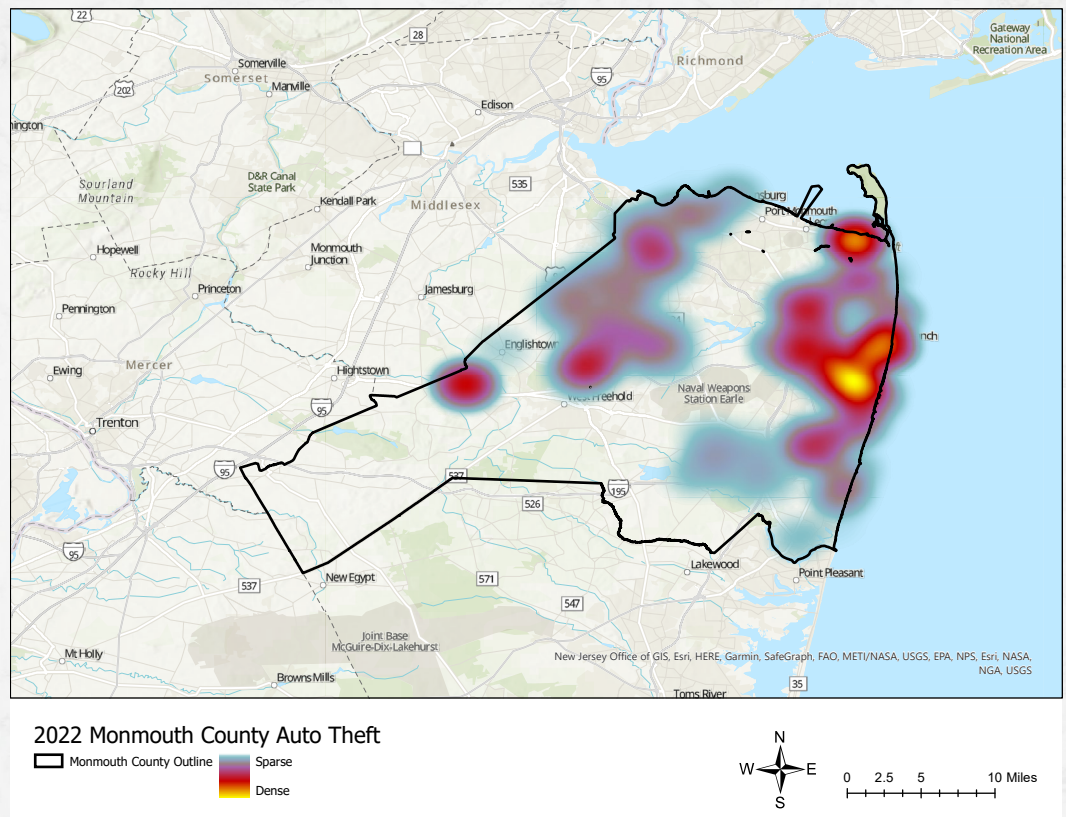
Monmouth County had 314 car thefts the first eight months of 2021 and 446 the first eight months of 2022. Furthermore, from January 2021 through August 2022, 100 individuals were committed to the Monmouth County Correctional Institution in connection to those auto thefts, 82 of them were released, 28 were re-arrested on similar charges, and, 19 of those re-arrested were again released. In addition, 56 individuals were also arrested in connection to auto theft but released on a summons, of them, 35 were re-arrested on similar charges.

Members of law enforcement have been tackling this issue from the onset and doing an excellent job. This is not a policing problem, but a policy one. The push for the legislature and Governor to address “Catch and Release” and a failed “Bail Reform Act” needs to continue and this five point plan must be adopted into law which includes:

1. A stepped up scale of mandatory bail and sentencing for re-offenders similar to a three strikes policy.
2. A mandatory hold of re-offending juveniles who should receive mandatory education and counseling.
3. Increased mandatory penalties for criminal rings or enterprises that employs juveniles as mules in the commission of the crime.
4. Increased penalties and mandatory sentencing for criminal actors using electronic GPS tracking devices.
5. Include a central transparency list of offenders and prosecutions to include publish arrests, rearrests, court outcomes and sentences.

Thank you to all the members of law enforcement throughout Monmouth County for maintaining the public safety of our residents. It is now up to the state officials to take charge and address this very serious issue plaguing communities.



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NATIONAL PREPAREDNESS MONTH

September was National Preparedness Month and the Monmouth County Sheriff's Office reinforced the message to prepare, plan, stay informed and get involved. National Preparedness Month, sponsored by the Federal Emergency Management Agency, is an effort to educate the public on how to prepare for emergencies.



National Preparedness Month is always a great time to reinforce Know Your Zone and learn which evacuation zone you are within by visiting mcsonj.org/ready. The Know Your Zone initiative was implemented by Office of Emergency Management six years ago to educate residents, visitors and businesses about coastal evacuation zones. It allows the OEM to direct any evacuation instructions to those that are at the greatest risk of experiencing storm surge during major coastal storms in protection of lives and property. Another way the MCSO assists the public in disaster preparedness is to encourage all residents to be equipped with an emergency kit. Emergencies and events can strike fast, so the MCSO urges all to have a kit filled with necessities, should you become displaced and have to evacuate quickly. The MCSO STORM (Seniors Taking On Readiness Measures) has provided more than 2500 kits to 3000 residents.



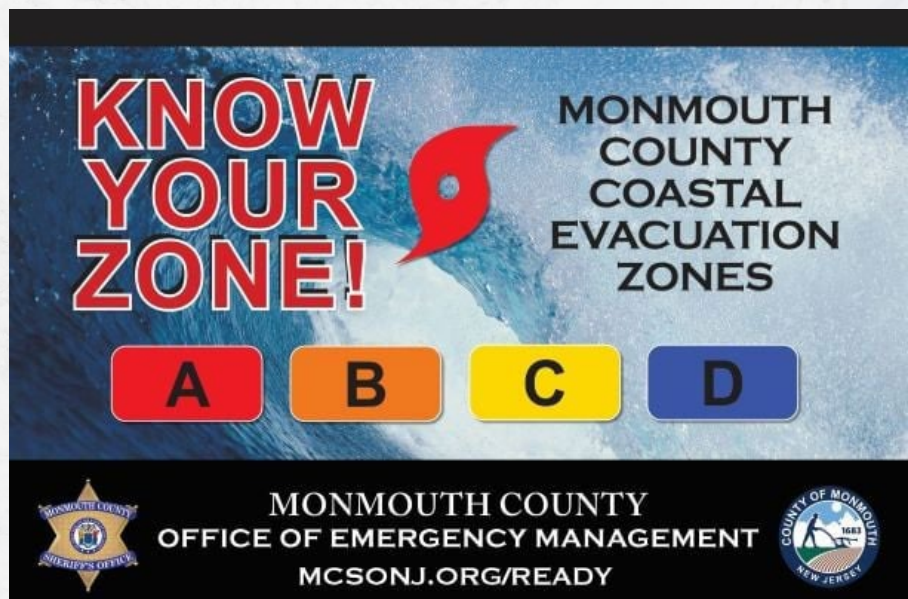

Also during National Preparedness Month Sheriff Golden was proud to announce during a register ready event at St. Denis School in Manasquan that Monmouth County is the statewide leader in register ready, by having more participants than any other county in the state. The register ready program, a partnership with MCSO OEM and the Monmouth County Office on Aging, allows residents with disabilities or access and functional needs and their families, friends, caregivers an opportunity to provide information to emergency response agencies, so emergency responders can better plan to serve them in a disaster or other emergency.



To keep up with the most up to date information, it's also important to like or follow the MCSO on social media through Facebook, Monmouth County Sheriff's Office, Twitter, @MonmouthSheriff, and Instagram, monmouthsheriff, all platforms that prove to be extremely useful before, during and after severe weather. In addition, download the agency's application for smartphones. Our app provides instant access to sheriff's office related information, which includes real-time emergency notifications through its integrated push notification system. Users are able to be instantly alerted to weather, or other emergency related situations, from the MCSO and the agency's OEM.

Please don't forget that Planning Preparing and Staying Informed are the keys to safety before, during and after a weather related event.



MILITARY HONORS FOR FORGOTTEN VETERANS

Monmouth County Sheriff Shaun Golden continues the mission of ensuring that veterans who fought for our freedom won't be left behind. On September 8, one by one, the remains of 16 forgotten veterans and two spouses from WWII, Korea and the Cold War eras were carried out from the Monmouth County Sheriff's Office in Freehold as they began the journey to their final resting place during a procession to Brigadier General William C. Doyle Memorial Cemetery in Wrightstown, with stops at the Hall of Records in Freehold, CentraState Medical Center and Prospertown Lake in Jackson. This momentous event, Military Honors For Forgotten Veterans, led by the Monmouth County Sheriff's Office in support of the Vietnam Veterans of America New Jersey Shore Area Chapter 12, provided our veterans whose remains were never claimed with a salute to arms and a proper sendoff. We could never repay our veterans for the sacrifices they have made, but what we can do is never forget. It's most important that these veterans who served our country are given respect and provided a proper burial filled with dignity and honor. The Monmouth County Sheriff's Office is proud to host this significant event and thank the Vietnam Veterans of America Chapter 12 for their commitment and tireless work to ensure these forgotten veterans receive full military honors. To date 113 veterans or spouses have been interred and 26 were returned to family by VVA Chapter 12.

SHERIFF GOLDEN DISCUSSES BACK TO SCHOOL SAFETY



Back to School Safety

- Don't block the crosswalk when stopped at a red light or waiting to make a turn, forcing pedestrians to go around you; this could put them in the path of moving traffic
- In a school zone when flashers are blinking, stop and yield to pedestrians crossing the crosswalk or intersection
- Always stop for a school patrol officer or crossing guard holding up a stop sign
- Take extra care to look out for children in school zones, near playgrounds and parks, and in all residential areas
- Never pass a vehicle stopped for pedestrians
- Never pass a bus from behind – or from either direction if you're on an undivided road – if it is stopped to load or unload children
- If the yellow or red lights are flashing and the stop arm is extended, traffic must stop
- The area 10 feet around a school bus is the most dangerous for children; stop far enough back to allow them space to safely enter and exit the bus

Back to School: DANGERS OF STRANGERS



- Never walk alone, always use the buddy system.
- Don't approach or talk to strangers. If approached by a stranger asking a question ignore them.
- Do not engage, even if the stranger asks for help or has something you would want to play with such as a puppy or kitten.



- Never give out personal information about yourself or family.
- If you feel you are in a dangerous situation, yell, run and fight back.
- Do not be afraid of police, they are there to help.
- Know how to dial 9-1-1 and report suspicious activity or behavior.



With the start of a new school year, it's vital to practice back to school safety tips. Throughout September, Sheriff Golden provided parents and students with helpful safety tips pertaining to cautioning drivers while sharing the roads with school buses, teens who are about to get behind the wheel or are already driving, and, the dangers of strangers. It was a great turnout. Sheriff Golden thanks all who came out to Walk at Lunch and Monmouth County's HR department for hosting the event.



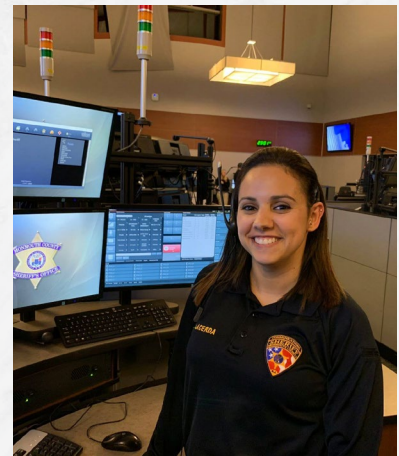
PATRIOT NIGHT
