Hope all had a wonderful Thanksgiving. It marks the beginning of the most joyous season celebrated with family and friends. Here at the Monmouth County Sheriff's Office, safety is always of the utmost importance and this time of year is no exception.

While people gather to celebrate throughout the season, there will be an increase of travelers on the roadways. As a result, the Monmouth County Sheriff's Office, along with partners in law enforcement, will be putting the brakes on drunk drivers by participating in the "Drive Sober or Get Pulled Over" campaign to keep roadways safe and free from drunk drivers. If you are going to drink, don't drive, it's as simple as that. Patrols are being increased and sobriety checks will be set up throughout Monmouth County where motorists will be stopped to maintain safety.

The national "Drive Sober or Get Pulled Over" holiday campaign is a nationwide effort to raise awareness about the dangers of impaired driving through enforcement and education and lasts throughout the month of December to January 1.

In New Jersey, an individual is considered over the legal limit if he/she operates a motor vehicle with a blood alcohol level concentration of .08 or greater. In an effort to avoid presenting a danger to oneself or others, it's important to follow these safety tips:

- Before going out, designate a driver who will not consume any alcohol the entire night.
- **DO NOT DRIVE** if you are impaired. Call an uber, a cab, a sober friend or family member. If you don't have a ride, stay where you are.
- If you see someone about to get behind the wheel or on a motorcycle after they have been drinking, take their keys and find them a ride with someone who is sober.
- **Under no circumstances** should adults provide alcohol to a minor or allow anyone under 21 to consume alcohol while at their home.

OEM REVIEWS SHELTER PLANS

The MCSO is always preparing and on Nov. 2, staff from OEM, the Monmouth County Health Department, and Brookdale Community College officials reviewed Monmouth County disaster shelter plans and discussed logistics and shelter layout. This is a great partnership and coordinated effort to ensure safety in the event of an emergency.



CERT COMPLETES TRAINING

After seven sessions, the MCSO OEM Community Emergency Response Team (CERT) completed their basic training on Nov. 15, ending with the topic of homeland security presented by MOCERT Commander Bernard "Bernie" Fowler. Sheriff Golden is proud to now have 24 trained CERT members available throughout Monmouth County to assist with emergencies and disasters. Moving forward, CERT will meet and train monthly and be ready to assist during emergencies as needed. Those interested in becoming CERT Team members should keep an eye out for course announcements in early 2024.



MCSO PARTICIPATES IN MARITIME SECURITY EXERCISE

Members of the MCSO's Law Enforcement Division participated in an important Maritime Security Exercise on Nov. 1, led by the FBI - National Joint Terrorism Task Force, which included Police/Fire, K9 Teams and Marine units from federal, state and local agencies. Locations were at Liberty State Park in Jersey City and the United States Coast Guard in Bayonne.

Sheriff Golden is proud that the MCSO K-9 Teams and members of Marine 1 participated in this important exercise. K9s were familiarized with different types of vessels and challenged in their scent discipline, where multiple buildings and structures were used for hides.

MCSO RECOGNIZES NATIONAL ALZHEIMER'S DISEASE AWARENESS MONTH

November was also National Alzheimer's Disease Awareness month and Sheriff Golden and the MCSO work hard to provide programs and initiatives that assist in maintaining the safety and wellbeing of individuals with Alzheimer's Disease. An important program at the MCSO is Project Lifesaver which helps locate individuals through radio signals that track people with Alzheimer's disease and autism when they wander and become missing.

Project Lifesaver is a critical lifesaving tool. There are currently 174 individuals on the Project Lifesaver program in Monmouth County, with 35 adults and 139 juveniles. Each radio transmitter worn by an individual has a unique frequency. From January 2021 to date the MCSO has had 26 Project Lifesaver activations. The MCSO also works closely with the Monmouth County Prosecutors Office on the Monmouth County Special Needs Registry, where families register loved ones with special needs, for first responders to respond in the safest and most efficient way.



GUEST SPEAKER ADDRESSES RECRUITS ON AUTISM AWARENESS

Sheriff Golden and staff at the Monmouth County Police Academy were proud to have Alex Mann serve as a guest speaker for the recruit class during a presentation on "Handling Individuals with Special Needs" on Nov. 13.

Alex is autistic and a huge supporter of law enforcement, who routinely tours public safety agencies and learns all about operations. Alex's journeys have taken him to five states, the furthest being California. He has visited 450 police departments including the MCSO and is always ambitious and eager to meet with members of law enforcement.

The MCSO thanks Alex for his continued support of law enforcement.



COFFEE WITH COPS

It was time for the monthly "Coffee with Cops and Conduct" at Brookdale Community College on Nov. 8, where sheriff's officers were eager to meet and greet students, faculty and staff. 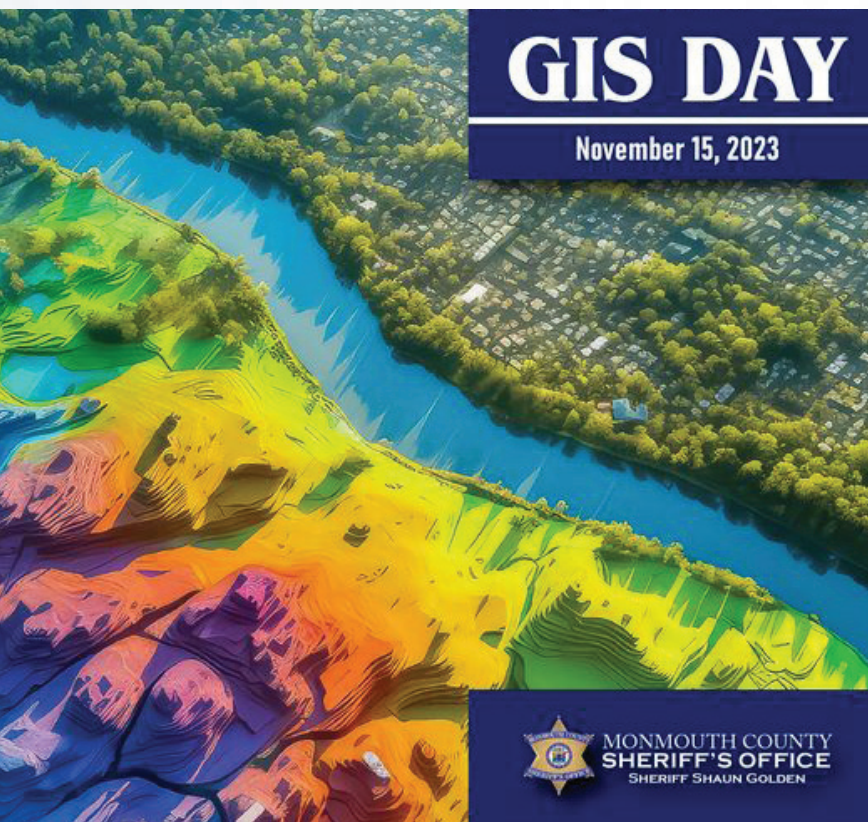
MCSO PARTICIPATES IN A WALK IN THEIR SHOES
