For the many beachgoers, following the proper precautions when swimming is of the utmost importance, as we unfortunately deal with drownings each year and must make rescues due to dangerous rip currents. That's why it is vital that we stress all summer to only swim when lifeguards are on duty. Also, be sure that children and adults know how to swim before entering the water, and never swim alone. Avoid rip currents, and if you get caught in one, swim parallel to the shore. In addition, know the weather forecast when swimming in the ocean and be aware of rough surf and signs telling you not to swim.

Recently we recognized Safe Boating Week. To reiterate once again, if you are boating out on the waterways, it's important to practice safe boating tips. The MCSO Marine 1 and 2 Units, along with partners in law enforcement will be patrolling the shore areas throughout the season to ensure safety and respond to critical water related incidents.


SHERIFF GOLDEN HOSTS HUMAN TRAFFICKING SYMPOSIUM

Sheriff Golden was proud to host the MCSO's Human Trafficking Symposium, May 12 with Congressman Chris Smith, a leading voice in the fight against this heinous crime, and Monmouth County Prosecutor Raymond Santiago. The panel of experts on this extremely critical topic, included Special Agent Brian Salamone, FBI, Rachel Hertzberg, Tactical Specialist-FBI, Keyla Munoz, FBI Victim Specialist, Gina Cavallo, NJ Coalition Against Human Trafficking, who provided a compelling victim account, and Det. Sgt. Mark Wettengels, New Jersey State Police.

Human Trafficking is one of the most under reported and largest criminal enterprises in the nation. Topics at the symposium included federal laws passed to combat human trafficking, law enforcement efforts in preventing and prosecuting, resources for victims, protection, and emergency services.

Thanks to all participants who provided vital information. Bringing together stakeholders from law enforcement, government and nonprofit organizations work towards developing comprehensive strategies to combat this reprehensible crime.







RECRUITS GRADUATE FROM THE POLICE ACADEMY

The graduation of 90 newly sworn law enforcement officers from the Monmouth County Police Academy was held at Brookdale Community College on May 28. Nine recruits of the 108th Basic Course for Police Officers, 57 recruits from the 59th Basic Course for Class II Special Law Enforcement Officers and 24 recruits from the 44th Basic Course for County Correctional Police Officers received their Police Training Commission certifications during a ceremony held at Brookdale Community College.




NATIONAL CORRECTIONAL POLICE OFFICERS WEEK

The Sheriff Youth Week program offers a unique opportunity for young people to explore interests in law enforcement through police academy-style training, drill and exercise programs and instructional sessions at the Monmouth County Police Academy, 2000 Kozloski Road, Freehold, NJ.

Application MUST be received by May 15, 2025

The 32nd Annual Sheriff Youth Week is being held July 7 through July 11, 2025, from 7:45 a.m. to 4:00 p.m. daily. Each day's session begins with drill instruction and ends with one hour of physical training. Each recruit will receive a certificate from Monmouth County Sheriff's Office upon completion of the academy.

Recruits are taught by municipal, county, state, and federal law enforcement agencies.

Sheriff's Youth Week is free of charge and open to all Monmouth County residents of high school age - which means - just graduated 8th grade and going into high school in September, already in high school. Students will only be asked to provide a completed physical form once their application is approved, and background check successfully completed.



Successful applicants will be sent a letter of acceptance.
